Crash Course in Tagalog

Tagalog, the official national language of the Philippines, is rich in cultural history, diverse influences, and has a melodic sound. Learning a few basic phrases, such as "Kumusta ka?" ("How are you?") or "Salamat!" ("Thank you!"), can go a long way in showing respect for the locals, instantly winning their hearts. Both are pronounced just as they are written.

But don't worry — most Filipinos speak English fluently, as it's the official business language in the Philippines. This makes travelling easier and allows for more meaningful connections with the locals.

Avoid using the acronym "P.I." when referring to the Philippine Islands. This term was used during colonial times and is no longer favoured, as the Philippines is proudly recognised as an independent nation. While it's true that the country is made up of many islands, the term can be seen as derogatory. Additionally, "P.I." is also an abbreviation for a Filipino curse, so it's best to stick to simply calling it "The Philippines."

WESTERN AND CENTRAL VISAYAS

- **Beaches and Underwater Adventures:** Cebu, Bohol, Negros Oriental, Siquijor, and Boracay offer stunning beaches and world-class diving spots.
- **Culinary and Cultural History:** Iloilo and Bacolod are rich in gastronomic heritage. Negros Occidental, known as the sugar capital, and Guimaras, home to the sweetest mangoes and the vibrant Manggahan Festival, are must-visit spots.

BICOL REGION

- **Adventure, Nature, and Volcanoes:** Mount Mayon in Albay is perfect for thrill-seekers with activities like ATV rides and ziplining.
- **Natural Wonders and Wildlife:** Donsol, Masbate, and Ticao Island are known for their stunning beaches, caves, bays, and opportunities to swim with whale sharks and manta rays.

Travelling from Island to Island: How to Get Around?

Once you've decided which islands to visit, the next step is figuring out how to get from one to another. The Philippines offers a range of transportation options by air, sea, and land, ensuring seamless island-hopping adventures.

By Air: The most efficient way to travel between major islands is by domestic flights. Numerous flight connections link the main islands, although many routes require a layover in Manila and other parts of the country.

By Sea: For inter-island travel, passenger ships and smaller ferries are essential. Traditional "bangka", small wooden boats with outriggers, offer an authentic experience, while modern speed boats provide quicker journeys. Large cruise ships also frequently dock in and out of Manila, offering a more leisurely travel option.

By Land: Navigating the islands by land is straightforward, thanks to national highways and an extensive public transportation network. The jeepney, a colourful symbol of Philippine culture, is the most popular mode of transport, alongside cabs, buses, tricycles, and even trains in urban areas. In some cities, you can also enjoy a ride in a calesa, a traditional horse-drawn carriage.

One of her top recommendations is the **Binondo Food Walk in Manila**, where guests can experience a blend of cultural and historical exploration with a culinary twist. "True to the saying, 'the way to the heart is through the stomach,' your guests will uncover the city's rich heritage while savouring local delicacies and getting a glimpse into the daily lives of the locals," says Mayet.

For a more immersive experience, Mayet suggests visiting the Aeta community in the jungles of Subic, just three hours from Manila. "This visit offers a rare opportunity to delve into the traditions and lifestyle of the Aetas," she notes. "Tribal members will guide guests on hikes through the lush Bataan forests, sharing insights about sustainable projects within their community."

Mayet also recommends exploring the breathtaking **rice terraces of Banaue** and the **mysterious caves of Sagada** in northern Luzon. "These sites offer a close encounter with indigenous cultures, bustling markets, and stunning mountain landscapes, perfect for adventurous travellers."

Above, Below, and Beyond the Beaches

Marj Aquino, our Head of Sales and Marketing, finds her inspiration in nature. Her favourite spots include the world-famous **Chocolate Hills** in Bohol, part of the first UNESCO Global Geopark in the Philippines. "Nearby, your guests can visit the Tarsier Sanctuary and get up close with the world's smallest primates," she shares as an insider tip.

Palawan, Marj's favourite island, is a natural paradise. "Besides the iconic Twin Lagoon, Palawan offers unique experiences for nature lovers, including the chance to see dugongs (manatees). For divers, the **Tubbataha Reefs**, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, offer an unparalleled marine ecosystem, while Coron is a haven for wreck divers with its sunken Japanese ships," Marj enthuses.

She swears by **Siargao**, the surfing capital of the Philippines: "The island is famous for its world-class waves, especially the legendary Cloud 9, which draws surfers from around the globe. With its relaxed island vibe and pristine beaches, Siargao is a dream destination for surfers of all levels."

Jona also recommends the **Masungi Geo Reserve**, known for its unique geological formations. "Adrenaline junkies will love walking across the floating net 'Sapot', climbing the highest peak 'Tatay', or tackling suspension bridges and rope courses. A special highlight is the 'Duyan', a massive hammock spanning several hundred metres that offers breathtaking views of the surrounding landscape."

Boodle Fight

Gregor Zajc, our General Manager and resident foodie, highlights the **Boodle Fight** as a must-try experience. "This communal feast, rooted in military tradition, is a vibrant way to dive into Filipino culture. Various dishes are spread out on banana leaves, and everyone eats together using their hands. It's a true expression of unity and community, featuring grilled fish, meat, seafood, rice, vegetables, and tropical fruits."

Gregor's personal favourite is **Adobo**, the unofficial national dish of the Philippines. "This dish is a flavorful blend of salty, sour, and spicy notes, usually prepared with chicken or pork marinated in vinegar, soy sauce, and spices, then slow-cooked to perfection. It's a flavour explosion your guests won't forget."

For dessert, Gregor recommends **Halo-halo**, a shaved ice treat with a colourful mix of ingredients. "The name 'halo-halo' means 'mix-mix,' and the dessert lives up to it with a variety of toppings, including ube, a local purple root vegetable that adds both flavour and visual appeal."

Manila is also home to some top-notch dining spots. Gregor's recommendations include:
